So I was very surprised when a petite young woman walked into our lobbyist meeting. Ms. Ariana is the current lobbyist for the City of Tucson who works with the Arizona Legislature. Her lessons to Girls State lobbyists were insightful and also changed my personal beliefs about the role of lobbyist within a government.

For starters, anyone can hire a lobbyist: specific towns, school districts, environmental advocacy groups, etc. It is important to remember that lobbyists are not hired to push their own opinions, but rather to push the agenda of their own clients, and be the voice for those the legislature might neglect. For example, Arizona works to represent three key ideals passed by the Mayor of Tucson. Her job is truly fascinating and she loves it. She actually remains in

contact and maintains personal relationships with a large majority of Arizona State legislatures. Including both of our speakers Stefanie Mach and Steve Farley whom are legislatures from Tucson.

Arizona is incredibly busy, particularly around January through mid-April. This time period marks the 100-day regular session of both house and state. In 2014 alone the regular session produced 1300 bills. While most of these get killed in the first few months, Ariana must listen to them all to catch those that will affect Tucson. This year that number totalled 50 bills, all of which she read from cover to cover.

The tough part of Arizona's job is first deciding which bills are a direct threat to Tucson. Next, she must organize those that threaten the Mayor's ideals. Then she must lobby against those that could be drastic, or for those that will accentuate the key goals of Tucson. In short, lobbyists play an invaluable piece in reminding the representatives of our state how their potential decisions could affect the constituents they represent.
