The poppy is one of the most widely recognized American Legion Auxiliary programs. Each year, usually around Memorial Day, Auxiliary volunteers distribute millions of bright red crepe paper poppies in exchange for contributions to assist disabled and hospitalized veterans.

The program provides multiple benefits to veterans and community. Hospitalized veterans who make the flowers are able to earn a small wage and the physical and mental activity provides many therapeutic benefits.



The poppy's worldwide symbol of sacrifice is worn by Auxiliary members to honor the men and women who served and died for their country in all wars, including the Global way on Terrorism.

Donations are used exclusively to assist and support veteran and remind the community of the continuing needs of our veterans.

Hopefully next year when you see ladies from your local Auxiliary Unit with their poppies, you'll help them to help support our veterans who have given so much!

## *Adopt-A-Highway*

Roadside litter costs millions of dollars annually to control. *Adopt-A-Highway* is a service program that utilizes volunteer teams to pick up trash along American's roadways.

Participation also may include planting and establishing trees for wildlife, removing graffiti or controlling vegetation.

Many states will install a sign recognizing the adopting group's name for their contribution to keeping roads litter-free.

To get involved, contact your state's Department of Transportation.

## *Habitat for Humanity, Int.*

*Habitat for Humanity International* is a nonprofit, ecumenical Christian housing ministry that seeks to eliminate poverty housing and homelessness from the world and to make decent shelter a matter of conscience and action.
