



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# Heat Stroke? More Likely Than You Think

The projected high this week in the lovely city of Tucson is a whopping 111 degrees, yikes. With temperatures so high it is crucial that everyone take action to prevent themselves from being seriously injured. There is more to heat safety than drinking water, so it is important to know the warning signs of heat exhaustion before it escalates to a (sometimes fatal) heat stroke. Ask yourself the following questions when you're feeling the heat to assess your situation:

## Is that a cramp?

If you feel your leg or arm tighten up

suddenly while walking the campus this week, stop and wait for the feeling to go away. The first warning sign of heat exhaustion is called a heat cramp. Heat cramps occur when you are dehydrated and being physically active in a hot environment. To avoid heat cramps, drink plenty of water and stretch if you feel tightness in any muscle group.

## Am I sweating?

Ew, sweat. But we all do it, at least we should be. If you are sweating your body is sucking water right out of you in an attempt to cool you down faster. The first drop of sweat is water lost to your body so make sure to replenish. Now, if you've

stopped sweating, yet you don't feel cool at all and you're still making the trek across campus, seek medical attention. The first warning sign of a heat stroke is being sweatless while physically active in a hot environment. If you are no longer sweating, that means your body is completely out of water; this can often lead to fainting and you could injure yourself even further.

Be safe this week by drinking at least 3 or 4 water bottles a day, and even more if you're heading outside. Especially for those out-of-towners who are not used to the Tucson heat. Remember that there is ice and drinking fountains available in the laundry room to stay cool.

The spirit of competition is deeply ingrained in the nature of women. Within Girls State, citizens exercise their abilities to compete against each other. While such conflict can perhaps be divisive it is also good-natured and ultimately healthy.

There is, however, a conflict older than the struggle of woman versus woman, that is, woman versus nature. On Monday, Tucson was beset with high temperatures of nearly 109 F. Girls across the state, while rallying for their parties and positions, are ALL united against a common enemy-the weather.

Most would look upon sunny, cloud-

less skies as a sign of good fortune and good things to come (and indeed they may be!), but girls should take special care to look upon the UV index as well. Readings indicated a high of 10.8 on the UV index today in Tucson-meaning an extreme risk of harm from unprotected sun exposure. Girls toted umbrellas, slathered on sunscreen, sported stylish sunglasses, and took short cuts through the shadows to reduce their risk of exposure to harmful ultraviolet radiation.

It is essential that every girl take such precautions daily to protect their skin and remain healthy and productive citizens of Girls State. Even as we tire throughout the challenges and activities of the week we must remain vigilant against this daily danger.

Much of the damage caused by such radiation is not so visible as a simple sunburn, but manifests in many unpleasant ways as we age, which include development of melanoma (skin cancer), ocular damage (such as cataracts and macular degeneration), and degeneration of skin tissues which can lead to premature aging.

Remember to apply, reapply, and reapply your sun screen. If you don't think you've applied enough-APPLY MORE. Sara Hubbard, your governor hopeful from the city of Ironwood, wood (pardon the pun) like to remind all girls to, "Wear sunscreen, fight the melanoma monster!" Take care of yourself and your fellow girls in these trying times of tremendous temperatures.


Going along with their slogan, their
