
things I wouldn't have otherwise, such as running for different leadership positions. I also love the community and love in our city, no one feels left out."

Girls State has provided us with the foundation needed to embark on a career in politics or in any other career field. The opportunities here are endless.





Although not all of their group members were present, it was still something that they won't forget.







Again, we departed to our dorms. Again, the Marshall called for voting to begin. For the very last time, Arizona Girls State voted.


