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The Art and Rhetoric of Politics

s Girls State has begun, so have local elections! In each city, the positions of Mayor, Councilmen, and Precinct Committeemen have all been up for grabs. To obtain these roles though, a 30-60 second speech must be cleverly put together and presented in an impromptu style. This puts much pressure on candidates but is also a great way to test their rhetorical skills.

Many girls at Girls State have taken AP Language, which is a class focused chiefly on rhetoric. By definition, rhetoric is the art of effective or persuasive speaking or writing, especially the use of figures of speech and other compositional techniques. In political speeches, rhetoric is heavily infused in writing, advertising, and public speaking. Even the teenage nominees know about this idea, and it assisted many in being elected to a city office.

Daniela Putu-Kang of the Nationalist

Party is a strong believer in strong rhetoric. She is currently reading "Win Every Argument" by Mehdi Hasan to learn how to improve her talent in debating. So far, Putu-Kang has learned three essential things: "First, understand both sides of the argument, and even learn more about the opposing side so that you can counter and make your argument stronger. Second, know your audience. Present in a way that they will understand, and in a way that will make them want to agree with you. Lastly, be respectful! No one will choose the side of someone who bashes them throughout their point. Stay calm and collected, do not go for someone personally. Stick to the facts." With the help of this novel, Daniela is glad to serve the Nationalist Party and the City of Ocotillo as a newly elected Precinct Committeeman!

Sonya Colattur and Maddie Carder also ran for Precinct Committeemen for their party; the Federalists. Although these two girls both got elected, their sense of rhetoric was approached differently. Sonya's speech was strong and fact-based, and Maddie's was more of a narrative filled to the brim with personal experience. Sonva stated that "...this is Girls State! Women's Rights is what this body of students is all about. We are at the forefront of the future, and women deserve a seat at the table." Her speech inspired many and began with statistics about women in the workplace, as victims of domestic violence, and involvement in politics. Maddie's, on the other hand, began with her experience in clubs, orchestra, and service organizations in her school and community. Her participation in these social and economic areas helped to relate Carder to the rest of the delegates. and therefore would help her represent her peers as a Committeeman.

Whether it be following steps, sharing facts, or enlightening others with personal anecdotes, rhetoric is omnipresent in politics and continues to lead candidates to success!


Food Review of the Week





"Why County Government"

To start off our day, the members of the Girls State program attended a lecture from Lisa Matthews, the current Assistant to the County Administrator in Pima County.

During the meeting, she discussed the importance of communication, leadership, and open-minded discussions, as she detailed her work and impact.

Lisa Matthews has worked with Pima County for over thirty years and enjoys every bit of her experience, despite its high demand and workload.

To begin the lecture, Matthews began with a story of one of her largest projects - The Loop - in Pima County.

Initially, the area - now 137 miles of paved pathways and bike lanes - held expensive homes. These homes, however, were constantly under the threat of flooding, so in order to reduce the issue, the County Administrators proposed The Loop.

Despite its amenities, The Loop was widely disputed, as most residents of Tucson believed it was a waste of taxpayer dollars.

Instead of giving up, Matthews and her team worked to create celebrations centered around The Loop. During these public gatherings, Matthews would talk with the members of her community, hoping to gain insight into their views, opinions, and concerns.

Throughout her story, Matthews high-lighted the importance of "connect[ing] with your communities to learn their needs.

After discussing the responsibilities of her work, she began to discuss the broader topic of women's education and representation.

She stated, "...when I was coming through, I didn't see very many women in leadership positions...all the other [positions] were directed by men. Seeing that, and seeing how that space is changing, I absolutely try to inspire people".

When the lecture was finished, Matthews opened the floor to questions and provided delegates with incredibly insightful responses.

Angela Prevatt, a member of Yucca City, decided to target a part of the lecture Matthews described. While discussing some of the difficulties her work offers, Matthews described various instances of harsh criticism.

Prevatt, wanting to go further in-depth, asked Matthews to talk about how she dealt with the criticism she faced from her constituents and how she gathered the strength to keep moving forward.

Matthews - pointing out the importance

of self-confidence and understanding responded, "First of all, you have to know who you are. Know your strengths and know your weaknesses because people will pick you to the bone. But the next thing is to focus on what is the ultimate goal... people are going to have their opinions about you, good or bad, and sometimes the bad might be a bit of criticism you need to fix up, and sometimes the criticism is just hot air coming out of somebody's mouth... the challenge is - and what we need to do is focus on the ultimate goal".

Throughout her discussion - and while answering questions - Matthews also connected with the students through larger meanings.

For example, Ally Rumzis - a student from Yucca City - shared that her favorite statement was, "You have 24 hours to make as much of a difference as you can".

Matthews concluded her meeting with Girls State by offering advice, in which she confidently empowered the young ladies in the room by declaring how women need to fight for what they believe in and stand up for each other and themselves.

By focusing on empowerment and the impact of her work, Lisa Matthews captivated the students at Girls State and helped them realize the power women have.

Today, the students of the ALA Girls State Program were ecstatic to meet the incredibly accomplished Governor of Arizona, Katie Hobbs! During this meeting, Hobbs discussed her work and her contributions to her community while also highlighting the importance of passion and proper leadership skills.

To start with some background, Hobbs herself was a Girls State Delegate years ago. Her experience during the program helped her not only realize her future career path but also develop the skills necessary to succeed when in positions of leadership.

First, Hobbs provided some information about her past education and work. Hobbs studied at Northern Arizona University and Arizona State University, eventually earning a Master's Degree in Social Work. It was through her social work that Hobbs began to notice the immense amount of issues Arizona was struggling with.

At the end of her discussion, Hobbs handed the floor over to the Mayors of the Girls State cities. Our very own Yucca City Mayor, Caleigh Ragsdale, questioned Hobbs over the involvement of women in the political sphere and specifically - how women have impacted politics thus far.



In her answer, Hobbs stressed the importance of overcoming the stereotypes of women in politics, as females bring exceptionally detailed and thoughtful ideas, as well as "bring[ing] a different perspective to the table... it's not just about creating the jobs and building the economy for everyone, but what that means to someone's life and their family and how that affects them."
